The good news is that if you are ready to share your heart and home with one of America's most popular pets, now is a great time. Remember, there are a few things to consider. For a family with young children, small, playful kittens, although hard to resist, are probably not the best choice. A kitten who is several months old and still quite playful, or a young adult cat would be a better fit. Older cats who appear shy will do better in a quieter, adult household. If you are adding a cat to a family with dogs or other cats, be sure to ask adoption staff for helpful hints about how to make a successful introduction. A final thing to consider when selecting a feline friend is the length of the coat. All cats require some regular brushing, but those with longer hair will need it on a more frequent basis to promote a beautiful cat and prevent matting.

If you are considering adding a cat or kitten to your family, please consider a cat or kitten from your local shelter. If you do, you will be helping us save even more cats' lives this year.
